Program Goals

Creative Start is a new statewide program that seeks to close the opportunity gap by supporting culturally responsive arts integration practices in early learning communities. Selected FY20-21 sites will receive foundational arts integration training and funding for follow-up professional learning workshops designed with their community.

For this Creative Start launch, three early learning sites will be selected from three different <u>Educational Service</u> <u>Districts</u> (ESD) with the goal of supporting a Creative Start site in all nine ESDs by 2022. This program supports early learning communities that serve students in **preschool** through **3rd grade** (ages three through about eight years old).

Creative Start sites are eligible to receive:

FY 20:

- 2-day professional learning workshop (Creative Start Launch), May 2020.
 - Up to \$2,000 reimbursement funding for attending (travel and other associated expenses).
- On-site implementation support, May-June 2020.
- Grantees will submit a revised application to receive FY21 grant funds (June 2020).
- Grantees must participate in an evaluation interview (June 2020).

FY 21:

• Up to \$6,000 grant funding for FY21 site-developed arts integration professional learning plan.

Who Can Apply?

Any Washington State **public school/school district, tribal school** or early learning **non-profit organization** with 501(c)(3) status is eligible to apply and both teachers and/or administrators can serve as the lead partner. The lead partner is the legal entity with whom ArtsWA will contract and will be responsible for submitting invoices and the final report.

Who is Not Eligible to Apply?

Washington State law prohibits funding of parochial schools or other organizations with a religious affiliation or purpose. Individual artists, parents, or community members may not apply on their own, however, these individuals are encouraged to initiate and support projects in partnership with their local school, early learning center, or school district.

Selection Process Review Criteria

A panel of education and early childhood leaders, ArtsWA commissioners, and staff review your application alongside other applications in the same category. Applications are reviewed in detail and scored by each panelist using the review criteria listed below. The panel meets as a group to review their scoring decisions and recommends high scoring applications for the Creative Start Site program.

Review Criteria are standards panelists use to score applications (45 points possible). Strong applicants demonstrate a readiness to benefit from this support and have strengths in all three categories below.

1. Establish Site Communities Strengths and Need (15 points possible):

Why would your specific communities and students benefit from a culturally responsive arts integration approach?

- Provide clear, <u>developmentally appropriate</u> learning goals identified as a school focus (Language, Literacy, Social Emotional Learning, Science, Math, Social Studies, <u>21st century skills</u>).
- Address current strengths and gaps in youth and educator access to the arts in your learning community. What's already happening in arts and early learning? Where is there room for growth in this area?
- Address current strengths and gaps in culturally responsive practices in your learning community. What equity oriented professional learning supports are offered? Where is there room for growth in this area?

2. Partnership Capacity (15 points possible):

What types of collaborative partnerships in your community have the potential for supporting arts integration?

- Appropriate partners are committed to active collaboration and implementation, including school or district leadership.
- Project leaders demonstrate clear commitment to implementing the arts as a tool to reduce the opportunity gap.
- Family partnerships are at the core of the application.

3. Support for Teacher-Leadership (15 points possible):

How will your community collectively support teacher-leadership as part of your long-term arts integration plan?

- The application demonstrates clear support for teacher-leadership in culturally responsive arts integration.
- Leadership has the capacity to provide release time and proactive support for teacher-led collaboration, reflection and planning.
- Community plan emphasizes ongoing learning cycles for teachers including workshops, planning, implementation, reflection, and opportunities to refine their craft.

Application Requirements

Applicants must have:

- A site team that includes a minimum of; (1) Lead educator/teacher, (1) community member, and (1) school principal or early learning director that show readiness to implement and support this work.
- Letter(s) of commitment submitted by each of the team members listed above.
- Applications must be completed in full and submitted in Zoom Grants by March 20, 2020.

Creative Start Program Policies

- **Evaluation.** ArtsWA will work in collaboration with the Creative Start sites and a contracted evaluator to measure program effectiveness, community needs, and student learning outcomes.
- **Reporting**. Selected sites are obligated to submit a report at the end of FY20 as well as a final report at the end of the FY21 contract period.
- **Documentation**. We encourage sites to document their workshops and trainings with either digital photos, video, or both and to share this documentation as part of their final report. This helps ArtsWA demonstrate the value of our investments, and helps recipients demonstrate this to local leaders.

How to Apply:
