The award-winning Creative Districts program helps cities designate hubs for creative sector jobs, tourist and cultural activities, housing, and more.

There are eight certified Creative Districts in Washington: Chewelah, Edmonds, Issaquah, Langley, Olympia, Port Townsend, Tenino and Twisp.

Despite COVID-19, there is strong, continued interest in our program from all corners of the state. Several communities are moving forward with their District planning. They recognize the value of Creative Districts to catalyze economic growth and help build local resiliency.

Funding is important to the success of Washington's Creative Districts. As new districts are certified, we will need to support them with investment in the communities they serve. This investment will allow Creative Districts to contribute to and guide communities as they recover from the coronavirus pandemic and economic recession.

Funds will go toward direct technical assistance, initial program grants, ongoing capacity-building and leadership training, and more.
