Welcome to Poetry Out Loud 2024

When the Poetry Out Loud program first started in 2005, 8 schools in a single Washington county participated. This year, 42 schools from across Washington State participated in *Poetry Out Loud*.

After classroom-level competitions and school-wide competitions, these schools sent their top students to participate in one of four regional finals, held virtually this year in Central, Eastern, Northwest, and Southwest.

In addition, eight students from around the state registered for Poetry Out Loud Virtual, under the coordination of Tacoma Little Theatre. This program is available to individual students from non-participating schools, and home-schooled students. These students participated in their own final competition.

Top scoring students from each of these finals are competing today for the title of 2024 Washington State Poetry Out Loud Champion.

The winner of the State Final will receive \$200, and the winner's school will receive a \$500 stipend for the purchase of poetry books. The second-place finalist will receive \$100, with \$200 for their school library. The state champion will represent Washington State in the National Finals in Washington, D.C. April 30 – May 2, 2024.

The Poetry Out Loud National Finals will award a total of \$50,000 in scholarships and school stipends, with a \$20,000 college scholarship for the National Champion.

Over 9,000 students from across Washington participated in the program this school year, reciting poems selected from an anthology of more than 1,100 classic and contemporary poems.

Berkes studied English, Gender and Queer Studies, and African American Studies at the University of Puget Sound. Their senior thesis, a collection of poems entitled "Lesbo Island" was a finalist in the Stories Award for Poetry at Not a Cult Media.

Heidi Aijala, Judge

Heidi has over a decade of classroom experience at the secondary and post-secondary levels. Heidi holds a Ph.D. in English and a master's degree in teaching. Her scholarly work and pedagogical focus are invested in issues of equity, inclusion, and social justice. Moreover, as a first-generation college student, Heidi is passionate about advocating for the economic, social, and civic benefits of education.

Michelle Avitia, Judge

Originally from Los Angeles, Michelle moved to Washington to live and work in Olympia in 2018. She holds a B.A. from San Jose State University in English and Professional Technical Writing. Michelle spent many years writing and editing for independent literary magazines, held an editorial internship with Bitch Media, and a column with Catalyst Wedding Co magazine. In her free time, she enjoys linocut printmaking, playing every NYT word game, crushing her partner in sudoku, and volunteering at Community Print Olympia. Michelle currently works at ArtsWA as the Art in Public Places Program Coordinator.

Lou Oma Durand, Judge

Lou Oma Durand is a lifelong poetry lover. Over the years, she has produced numerous poetry events both live and for broadcast on public radio. This includes a curated series of original poetry by 30 young poets in high school across the state. She has also juried Poetry on the Bus for

King County, and for the selection of the WA State Poet Laureate. She has served on the boards of Copper Canyon Press, Poetry Northwest Review, Seattle Review, and Jack Straw Cultural Center. Lou Oma currently serves as a Commissioner for the Washington State Arts Commission (ArtsWA).

Heide Fernandez-Llamazares, Judge

Heide Fernandez-Llamazares is the Manager for My Public Art Portal at ArtsWA. She manages the online presentation of the State Art Collection. Previously, Heide managed a private collection, worked in Education at Tacoma Art Museum, and worked as a technical writer. Jasmine Mahmoud, Judge

Jasmine Mahmoud is Assistant Professor in Theatre History and Performance Studies at the University of Washington. A performance historian, her work engages the Pacific Northwest arts sector, racial equity, and cultural policy. Jasmine has worked as a musician, theater artist, arts critic, and as a TeenTix Mentor and Teaching Artist. She serves as Board Vice President of On the Boards. She earned her PhD in Performance Studies from Northwestern University, MA in Arts Politics from NYU, and BA in Government from Harvard College. Jasmine currently serves as a Commissioner for the Washington State Arts Commission (ArtsWA).

Kate Myre, Judge

Ms. Myre is a professor at Cornish College of the Arts and works nationally as a voice over artist and dialect coach. She has worked regularly with Pulitzer and Tony award winning playwright and director, Brian Yorkey, dialect and text coaching the Netflix series 13 Reasons Why, Echoes, and The OuterBanks. In Norway she coached the acclaimed production of The Hamlet Complex at the Royal Opera House, directed by Alan Oyen. She has coached for The Seattle Rep, The Seattle Children's Theatre, The Village Theater, Seattle Public Theater, Theater Schmeater, Jack Straw Foundation, and The Boston Repertory Theatre and will be dialect coaching again for ACT this spring on the Lehman Trilogy.
